We were delighted to welcome the parents of Year 12 students on Tuesday, with our Year 12 Meet the Tutor Evening. Moving from GCSE to A level study is a significant step for all students. The opportunity for us to meet and speak with parents to provide information and receive feedback is important to us as we work to support our students. Moreover, it was great for us to meet the families of the students who joined us as new students in Year 12 – we are fortunate indeed that these wonderful students have chosen to join CCHS.

On Thursday, we welcomed the families of Year 7 students to our New Parents' Welcome Evening. Certainly, the transition from primary school to secondary school is a major move for students and their families. We look forward to the seven years that this group of students will spend at CCHS, learning, building friendships and enjoying their time in their school community. Indeed, this academic year represents the final phase of our main school expansion, which began in September 2020, as we increased from five forms of entry to six forms of entry. Each main school year group (Years 7 to 11) now has 180 students, which is excellent. We now also have nearly 340 students in our Sixth Form, which we are thrilled with.

As this academic year progresses, there will be further opportunities for parents and families to attend the school, with other Meet the Tutor events, Parents' Evenings, the Dance Show, Music Concerts and the School Production. RE: Arrival at and departure from school

I have received feedback from local residents about their experiences during periods when students are arriving at and departing from school. Each week, in our Friday bulletin, we include a reminder about the importance of road safety at these times. Local residents have raised associated issues, with some parents parking inappropriately, e.g. across driveways, and dangerously, e.g. on footpaths.

CCHS has been part of this local community since 1907 and our relationships with and respect for our local community are very important to us, as I know they will be for you. Clearly we are a big school, as all the other local schools are. You may have noticed that CCHS senior staff are out on gate duty each morning and afternoon to ensure the safety of students as they leave, board buses and coaches, etc.

I ask for your continued vigilance and co-operation, please, to ensure that if you are dropping off or collecting your daughter, you remain mindful of the local residents around the school, including First Avenue, Corporation Road, Swiss Avenue, Westfield Avenue and Elms Drive, please.



On Thursday, we celebrated the European Day of Languages in conjunction with CCHS Culture Week with a focus on all the languages spoken in our community. Students filled in a questionnaire about which languages they speak. Of the 349 students who responded, 73% speak more than one language and 56 different languages were mentioned, reflecting the rich linguistic and cultural diversity of our community. Staff also displayed posters showing which languages they speak and which they would like to learn, revealing some hidden talents and ambitions. Finally, the Friday Frenzy quiz was designed around the same theme – did you know that over 7000 languages are spoken globally and there are more than 300 sign languages?





Chelmsford County High School for Girls

Keep on suing!

Context

The CCHS swimming pool was built in the 1960s, partly from funds raised by CCHS families. Dedicated upgrading and maintenance work over the years has ensured that the pool has served generations of students and young people across the Chelmsford community.

At the moment, our pool supports the PE curriculum for our 1,162 students, as well as nearly 200 pupils from five local primary schools, and nearly 600 young people from the wider community who use our pool with clubs.

Our swimming pool is truly a community pool.

Goal

Now is the time to modernise this important community resource to preserve it for future generations of students, pupils and young people. We are asking for your support now, just as the CCHS community rallied in the 1960s to ensure a pool was built, to help us achieve this important goal.

Fundraising

We estimate that the pool will require up to £250,000 over the next two years to bring it back to a suitable condition to support swimming in our community for the foreseeable future.

Our immediate need is to replace our aged boiler and gas pipework, which will cost approximately £35,000.
